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DAUGHTERS OF THE PIONEERS

Thirty-seven board members of the Daughters of Pioneers of Weber county, met Monday afternoon at the home of Daughter Minerva Stone Shaw, who is custodian of the pioneer relics.

Daughter Shaw invited the members into the garden where she had placed some of the relics among the beautiful flowers she had growing herself, which made a pleasing background.

Among these relics were several chairs of various sizes with buckskin things woven into seats, an old spinning wheel which was used by Roxanna M. Jones and was 100 years old, held a spindle of flax raised in 1857 by a Mr. Daniels of Huntsville, and attached to this was a napkin woven by his wife.

Near this was a "teach" which was a tall wooden rack in which ashes were placed, then water was poured on and when drained through the ashes it formed a dye, which ran out into an iron kettle. There was an old-wooden yoke used on the oxen; an old branding iron; a candle mould; a hand-carved pine frame made from wood, taken from near Pineview by Charles E. Lane; Indian baskets and beaded moccasins and bags. Hexagon-shaped spectacles with extension bows; old blue willow picture plates and various other relics were shown and were appreciated as only Daughters of Pioneers can appreciate these things.

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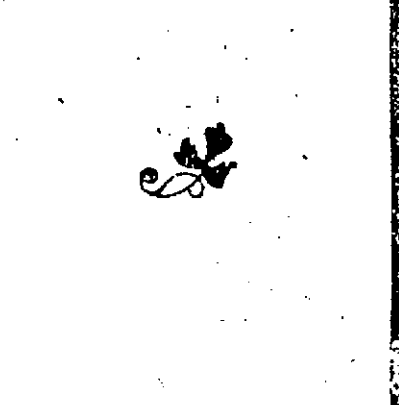
