Salesman Faces Manslaughter Charge for Woman's Death

OGDEN—Charge of involuntary manslaughter will be placed Monday against Cecil W. Webb, 33, asserted driver of the car which struck and killed Mrs. Jennie Barrows, a 42-year-old woman, Sunday night.



Webb, a Fort Worth, Texas, salesman and field secretary of Lions International, was arrested at the scene of the accident Wednesday night and lodged in the county jail. Bond was fixed at \$2000, but Webb was still in jail late Saturday.

State Bank Liquidation Expenses Approved

OGDEN—Approval of liquidation expenses for the Ogden State bank for April, amounting to \$14,494.24, was given by Judge Eugene E. Pratt in Second district court Saturday.

The expense petition included: Bank proper, including \$3090 for salaries, \$5557.92; operation of the Hyattton mine, an asset of the bank, \$3987.68; preservation of assets, \$3549.90; preservation of securities, \$1787.74.

An item of \$279.92 for traveling expenses presented by the state bank liquidation was taken under advisement pending submission of an itemized statement.

CREW TO BEGIN BUILDING CAMP

Work Starts Monday on First Utah Forest Corps Site

OGDEN—Construction of the first emergency civilian conservation camp in Utah, near American Fork in the Wasatch National forest, will begin Monday, it was announced Saturday by C. N. Woods, acting regional forester.

Fifty men will be employed on the site already selected and approved by U. S. army officers. Mr. Woods said that within ten days the camp will be in readiness for occupancy by the contingent of 200 workmen.

Bids are being received at the local forest office for tools and equipment for the second group of 25 camps, and it is expected they will be opened and contracts awarded Monday. The department also is calling for bids on camp stoves to equip the various camps in region No. 4.

In view of developments on state projects now under negotiation between Governor Henry H. Blood and Washington, D. C., the headquarters of the Ogden city-Weber county relief organization announced Saturday that enlistment of inexperienced men between the ages of 18 and 25 will continue the first three days next week.

The order to continue enrollment given out Saturday by M. Charles Woods, assistant manager, after the registration was closed Friday night, is understood to have important significance and is an indication that more men than originally expected would be given assignments.

Mr. Wood said registration will continue for young men Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at 9 a. m. and 2 p. m.

Calendar Adopted For School Term

OGDEN—The Ogden city schools will open the coming academic year on September 5 and the first semester will close January 19, 1934, according to the calendar adopted by the city board of education Friday night.

The second semester will open January 22, 1934, and close June 1, 1934.

Holidays were designated as follows: Thanksgiving day, November 30 and December 1; U. E. A. day, October 27; Christmas, December 21 to January 2; Washington's birthday, spring vacation, week of April 8, and Memorial day.

Observances will be held in schools Columbus day, Armistice day, Lincoln's birthday and Arbor day. W. Karl Hopkins, superintendent, reported 900 teacher contracts had been returned signed and only seven had failed to sign.

Interest Grows In Horse Show

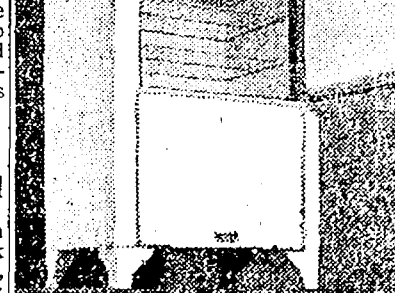

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Drunk Charges Bring Jail Term

OGDEN—Leroy Yearsley, 19, of 1408 Washington avenue, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to five days in jail Friday by City Judge Hyrum A. Behnap on a drunkenness charge. Judge Behnap declined to follow the recommendation of Assistant City Attorney J. Quill Nebeker for a 30-day suspended sentence.

Yearsley was arrested early Wednesday by Detective J. C. Hutchings and booked at the police station for drunk driving. The officer reported the youth ran his automobile into the front of a street car at Twenty-eighth street and Washington avenue.

Mr. Nebeker explained to the court that Yearsley was driving while drunk. He asked for the lesser charge and leniency because it was a first offense and "because he didn't feel like sending a boy his age to jail."

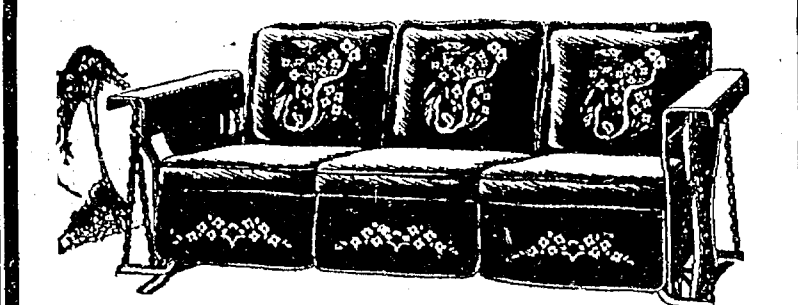
Officers who made the arrest said they found two stills and quantities of whisky and mash.

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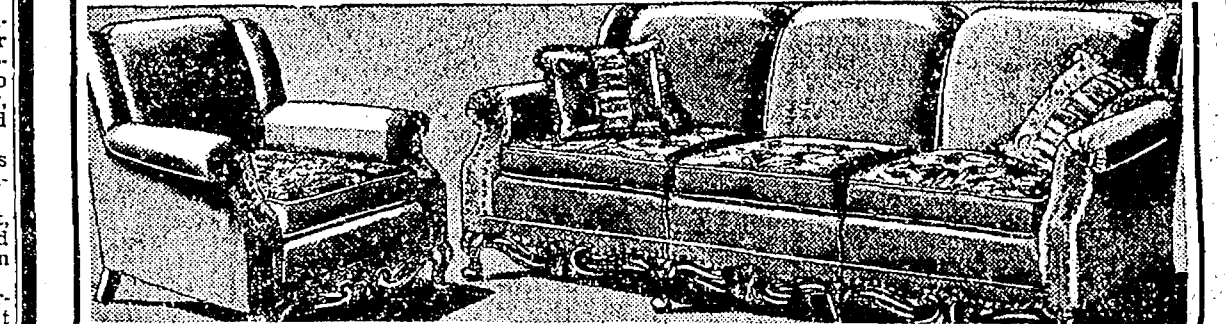

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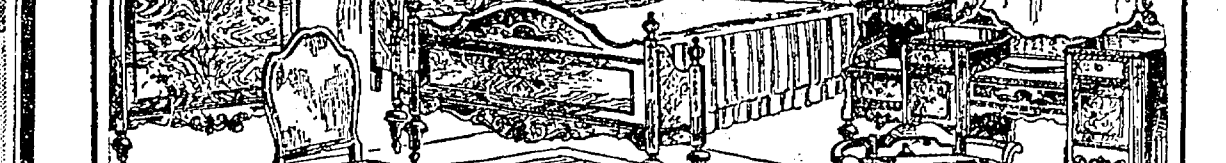
